The West End House first opened its doors in October of 1906; our benefactor was the beloved James J. Storrow. The purpose of the West End House was to have a meeting place where all boys could come together, form clubs, and have the chance to develop into the finest of citizens. Our first Executive Director was Mitchell Freeman, a kindly man whose great foresight, love for his fellow man, and wonderful guidance made the West End House what it is today. His untimely death came during World War I. It was then that Jack Burnes became our director and continued with the same sound policies of his predecessor. His able leadership brought us to even greater heights and fame in the Boys' Club field. After his retirement, he was succeeded by Wally Rubin, who ably carried on for two years and then transferred to another field. I am highly homored to serve as Executive Director of the famous West End House.

The camp was started on what we think is now the most beautiful location in Maine. We had only 18 campers, a single director, and a single cook in those early years; we slept in tents, had a small, wooden building for a recreation room, and another one for a dining hall. We carried on in rather primitive fashion, but we did have great times. As the inimitable Mr. Storrow once said: "At last the Messiah has come to the boys of the West End."

About twenty years later the West End House Alumni was formed—not only to get together on oscasions, but also to show our appreciation for the many fine things that were done for us when we were youths. The purpose of the West End House Alumni is to promote the usefulness and extend the service rendered by the West End House.





August 5-August 10: Color War.


August 8: Color War Track & Swim Meet.
