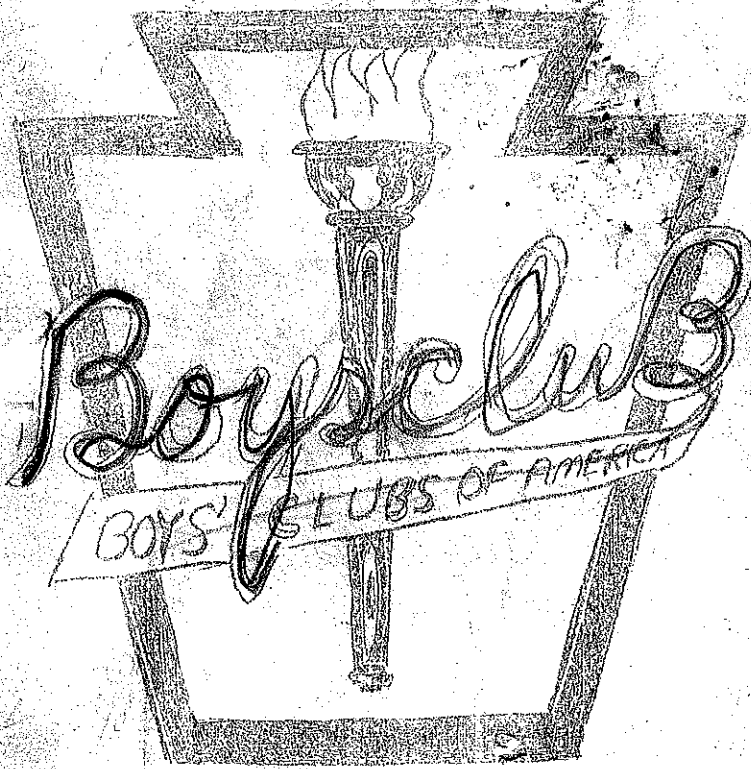

THE STORY OF WEST END HOUSE CAMP by ALLIE COLES

The West End House first opened its doors in October of 1906, and on October 22, 1966, the West End House will celebrate its 60th anniversary. Our benefactor was James J. Storrow. The purpose, to have a club house where all boys could meet, form clubs, and be good citizens.

The camp was started in 1908 on its present location. We think it is the most beautiful in Maine. We had only 10 campers and a single director in those early years, slept in tents, and carried on in a rather primitive fashion. Our only buildings were a small dining hall and a very small recreation hall. We did have great times. Then, about twenty years later, the West End House Alumni was formed. Not only to get together on occasions, but to show our appreciation for the many fine things that were done for us in our youth. The purpose of the West End House Alumni is to promote the usefulness and extend the service rendered by the West End House. To the Alumni goes the credit for the wonderful camp you see today. It is their work and their generosity that is directly responsible for all the buildings and all these great improvements we now have. The West End House Alumni Association is one of the finest in the United States. You, too, fellow camper, can someday be a member of this great Alumni. You are presently a member in good standing of our Junior department.

I know you are a fine group of boys, so stay healthy, do good work in school, and I hope we'll see you back next year.



## ARTS AND CRAFTS

This year West End House Camp embarked upon a new arts and crafts program under the direction of Robert Neeld who is an art supervisor and teacher in Maine. Members of the West End House Executive Committee, Counsellors, CIT's, campers, and George and Eddie Mouradian all aided in a renewal of Wonderland as an arts and crafts workshop. The director of the arts and crafts program greatly appreciates the tremendous help in this preparatory work.

Our focus this summer in arts and crafts has been on ceramics, the art of making objects from clay, and leathercraft. Mr. Irving Guberman has been of inestimable help in acquiring an electric kiln and other equipment and materials necessary in carrying out our program. Mr. Guberman utilized his experience in the leather products industry by introducing the art of leathercraft to our arts and crafts program. Mr. Guberman gave very willingly of his time by demonstrating step-by-step the basic skills required in making leather objects. Marty Jacobs, a CIT, worked for many hours at various times instructing and helping campers with their leatherwork.

Though we have not received all the necessary equipment and materials ordered, we have had a very active program. I am happy to note the wonderful enthusiasm shown by campers in making objects from both clay and leather. The desire of numerous campers to come to Wonderland during free play time indicates their keen interest in our arts and crafts program. It is a joy to work with such a well-motivated group of boys.

As we leave West End House Camp at the conclusion of this Camp season, may we all take "the Spirit of the House" into our every activity until we once again return to West End House Camp.


MESSAGE FROM MIKE GOLDSTEIN, ASSISTANT WATERFRONT DIRECTOR




## VARSITY BASEBALL

## BASKETBALL

Utilizing a simple but effective double tandem offense, the four basketball teams at West End House Camp posted a combined record of seven wins and two losses in 1966. This mark could just as easily have been 9 - 0, as both losses were by a total of four points.

Most impressive of all this season was the 13-and-under team, which won three games without a loss. In the first game (at O-At-Ka), unfamiliarity with the outdoor backboards, and some sloppy offensive set-ups combined to give this team its only scare of the season. At the end of three periods the score was 14 - 13 in favor of W.E.H., but then Brian Framson hit 6 straight points and Jan Singer took control of both boards, and West End House won going away, 23 - 18. Framson led all scorers with 11, while Singer had 8, and Phil Webber hooped 4.

In the second game, the team played closer to its potential both offensively and defensively as W.E.H.C. led all the way and came up with a 35 - 15 victory. Once again high point man was Brian Framson, who hit for 15. Pete Mason contributed 9, and Jan Singer had 8.

The third and final game of the season for the 13-and-under team proved to be the most devastating performance of any of the teams at camp this year. Playing a re-match against O-At-Ka at home, the WEH team dribbled, passed, and shot their way to a 52 - 15 romp. The game wasn't even close, as the 13 year olders played their best team ball of the year. Brian Framson swished in 17, Mike Barker had 14, Phil Webber 8, and Eliot Berkowitz and Randy Lempert 4 apiece.

The 14-year old team had only one game this season, against Camp Wakuta, at W.E.H.. After a slow start, Bert Savitsky and "Moose" Aron combined to bring the squad to an 8 point lead at half-time, 28 - 20, but then Wakuta came back. By the end of the third quarter, Wakuta had the lead, but then Savitsky hit again and Jeff Richmond got hot and it was all over, with the W.E.H. winning, 42 - 37. High scorers were Savitsky and Aron with 10, and Richmond who had 7, while Brian Framson and Chuck Schwartz played well off the boards. All-in-all, however, it was a disappointing performance for a team with outstanding potential.

The 15-year old squad posted a 1 - 1 mark this season, dropping the opener, 41 - 38, to Robin Hood, while beating O-At-Ka, 43 - 23. In the first game, some poor lay-up shooting and some poor defensive plays cost W.E.H. the game. The 15 year olders scored first, but Robin Hood stayed close, and took a 5-point lead going into the last quarter. It was here that Joel Saperstein took over and hit 5 straight points and Keith Sherman dropped in a 3-pointer, but it wasn't enough as Robin Hood hung on for the win. The second game was against O-At-Ka and was really no contest, as W.E.H. passed themselves to a 43 - 23 coasting victory. Top point man was Keith Sherman with 10, while Joel Saperstein chipped in with 8.

The 16-and-under team finished the season with a 2 - 1 record, losing the first game to Robin Hood, while winning the re-match and the subgame. The story of the first game was a big let-down in the fourth quarter that enabled Robin Hood to build up a 7 point lead, 57 - 50, going into the last minute. Then Steve Rubin came up with 4 straight clutch hoops, but Robin Hood hit on a breakaway to sew up the game, 59 - 58. Top scorers were Reggie Bird who pumped in 26, and Steve Rubin, who had 17. The re-match at Robin Hood was a different story, however. Still missing the inside shot, the team got tough on rebounds with Barry Ratner sweeping both boards and Reggie Bird and Steve Rubin leading the offense. The big surge, however, came in the last quarter, when W.E.H. outscored Robin Hood, 18 - 7 to win going away, 54 - 46.

The scoring leaders were Rubin with 18, Bird with 16, and Ratner with 10, while Neal Gerber and Paul Dominico played an all-around hustling game and tossed in 5 apiece. The rubber game was another ~~50-47~~ but Steve Rubin was just too much for Robin Hood to handle. Tossing in 32 points, pulling 21 rebounds, and blocking 4 shots, Rubin overwhelmed the Robin Hood team, and carried W. E.H. to a 61 - 59 victory. Also outstanding were Reggie Bird, who scored 20, and Keith Sherman, who had 4 clutch ones.

The counselors also had a team, winning two (82 - 85 vs. O-AT-KA, and 102 - 78 vs. Kester Falls), while losing one (87 - 81 vs. O-AT-KA). Top players were Jerry Feld, Carl Anderson, Rich Godfrey, and Bob Aisner.
