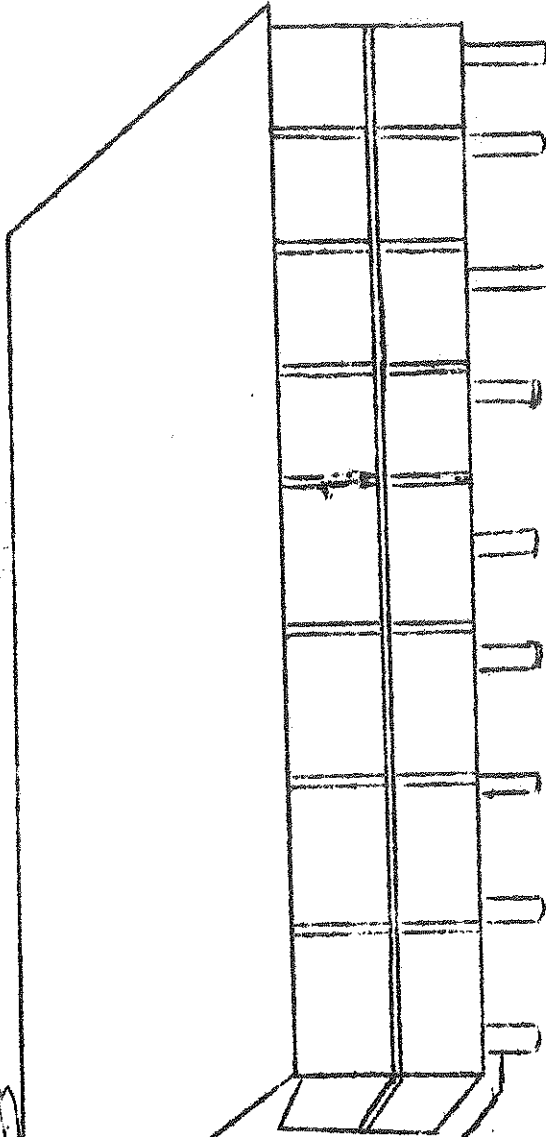


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

Again, best wishes for the coming year.





COLOR WAR 1970

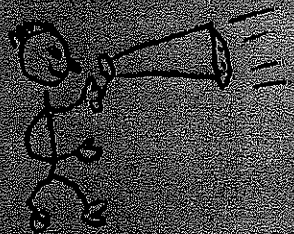

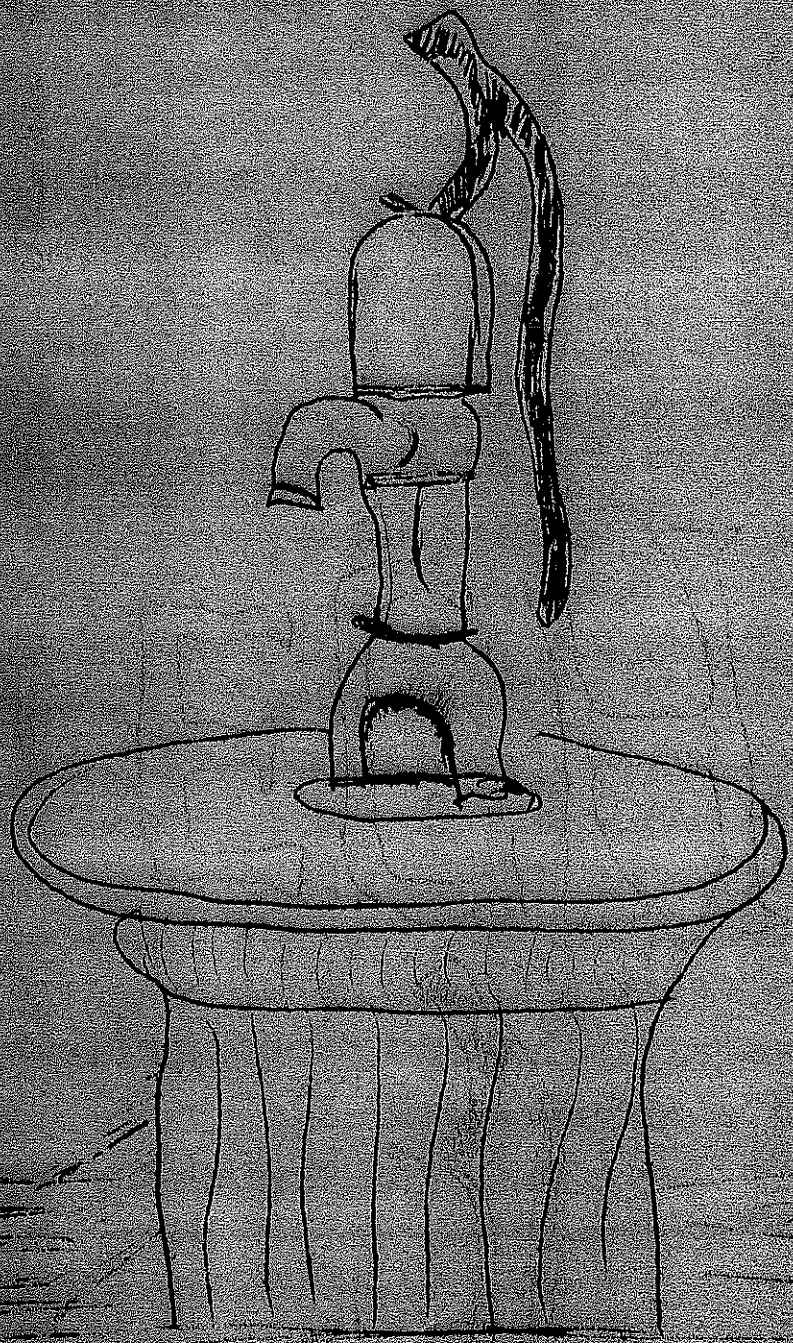
