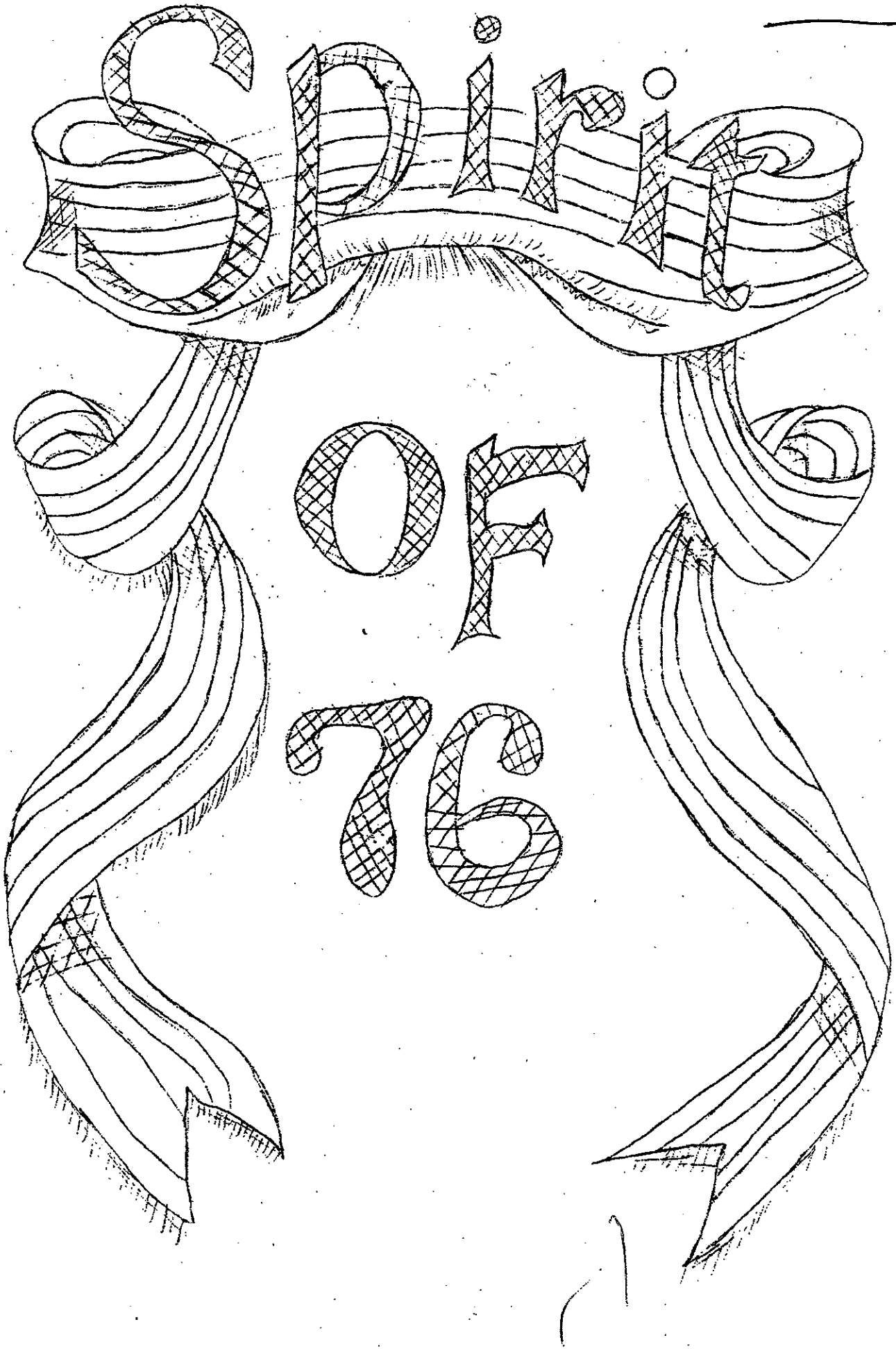

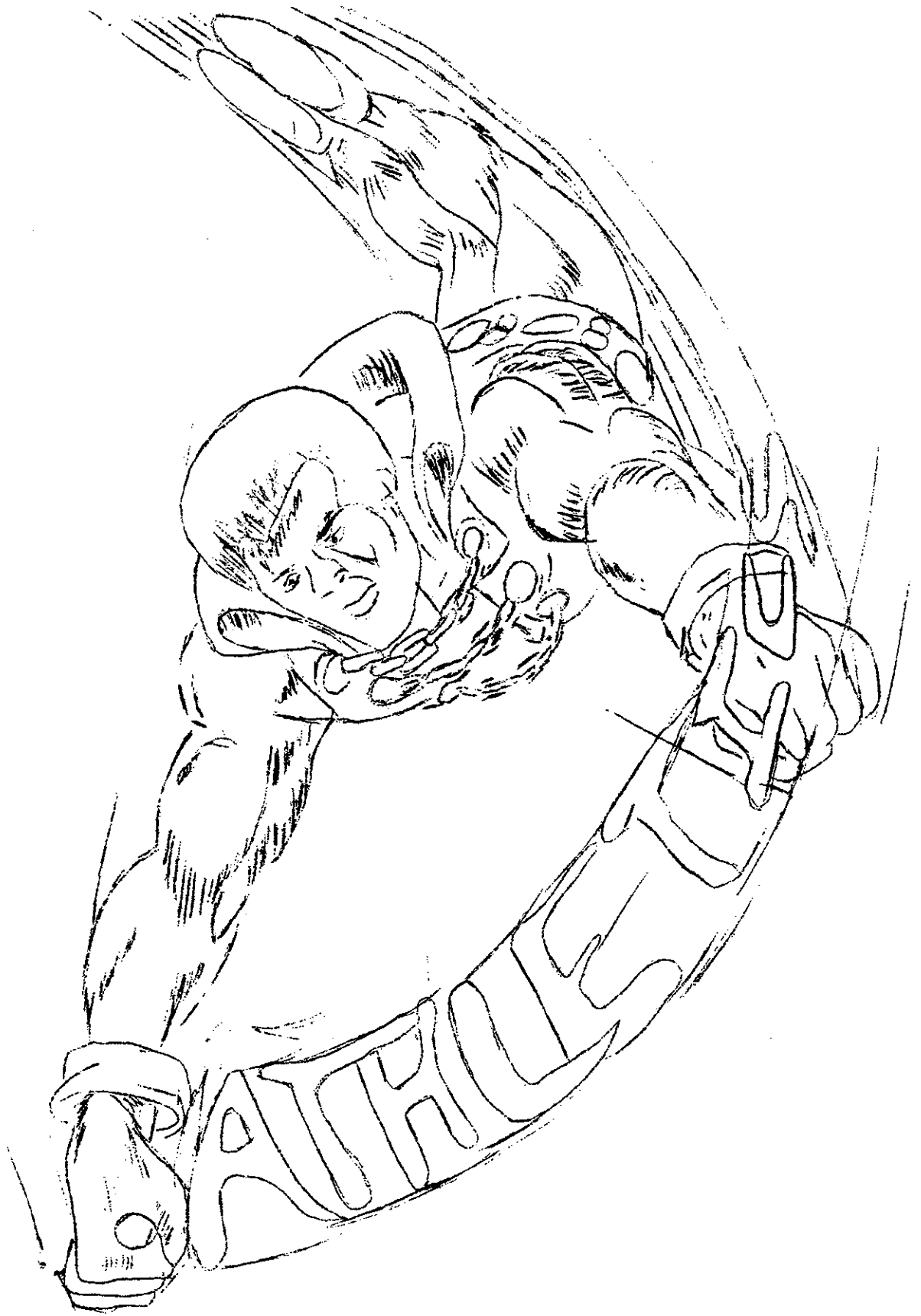

COLOR WAR 1976

On Tuesday, August 10, the rain finally stopped, hurricane Belle had missed the Camp and traveled into upstate Vermont instead. The sun had made an appearance for a brief while, and people were thinking of leagues and waterfront for the first time in weeks.

That night, the Stockmarket Game was held. All campers reported to the Council Ring where they were separated into 12 teams- banks- whose goal was to make the most money of all the banks. All campers moved down to the Mess Hall- the Wall Street of West End House Camp. After trading stock for a brief while, Solly made the announcement that a giant, multinational corporation had bought out all the corporations in the Camp, and that the President of the corporation would be arriving shortly to exchange shares in the small corporations for those in his company. A few minutes later, Steve Lepler jumped out of the kitchen painted white and blue- Color War had begun!

Blue kept pulling out in large leads, and White was constantly playing catch up Color War.
