

Bert and Esther grew up in the West End of Boston, where their childhood romance developed into sixty years of marriage! To look at them, you would not think they were even sixty years old, never mind married for that length of time!

ABOUT THE COVER

The WEH Camp has provided campers with round trip bus transportation from the Greater Boston area for many years now. The meeting places, however, have seen some changes.

Originally, buses departed from the West End House when it was on Blossom Street in the old West End. Once the Club was vacated in the late 1960s and sold to Massachusetts General Hospital, the meeting site was changed to the back parking lot of the Circle Theatre in Cleveland Circle, Brighton/Brookline line.

That lasted about ten years, until the management put a low overhang at the entrance to the back lot. It was too low for a bus to pass under it; thus, the camp then went to the Riverside MBTA parking lot in Newton – a spacious area that was the special favorite of the New York folks who did not have to enter into any city traffic!

When the MBTA lot changed from free parking to paid parking, the WEH Camp found another meeting place, this time the Franciscan Children's Hospital parking lot in Brighton. This, by far, is the ideal place – right around the corner from the WEH Boys & Girls Club, easily reached by public transportation or even by foot for boys who live locally; and easily accessible by car (right off Commonwealth Ave. and only about a mile from the Massachusetts Turnpike).

Pictured on the cover is Allie Coles, Executive Director of the West End House Camp from 1958 – 1972 (and also Executive Director of the WEH Boys Club from 1958 – 1971) checking in the campers at the Cleveland Circle site in 1969.

Allie had joined the Club in its very earliest days, attended the Camp, and prior to becoming Executive Director had been very active in the West End House and WEH Alumni Association. He had a great singing voice, which he used every morning to wake up the campers at first bell (7:30 a.m.) with a fine rendition of Irving Berlin's "Oh, How I Hate to Get Up in the Morning!"
