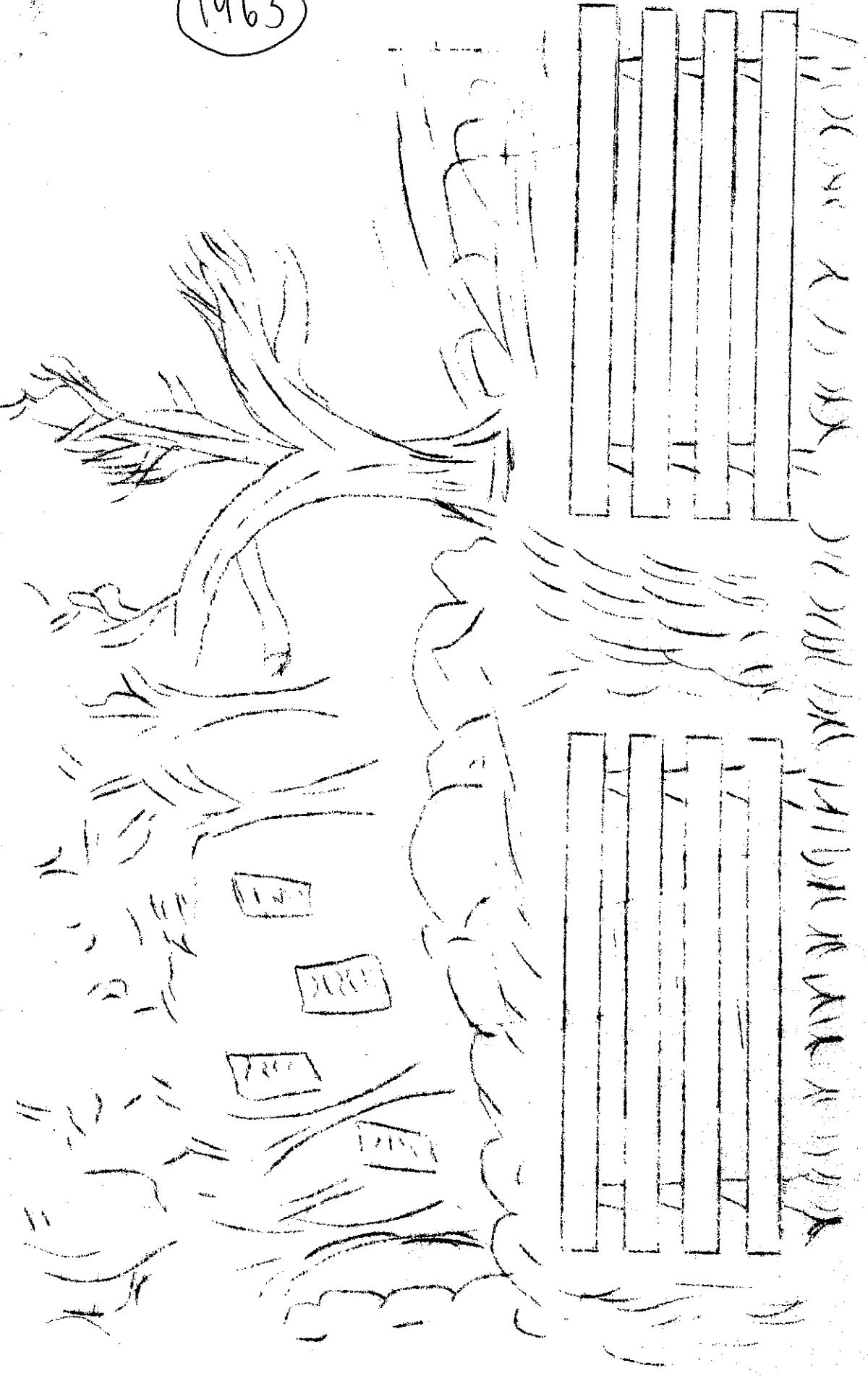

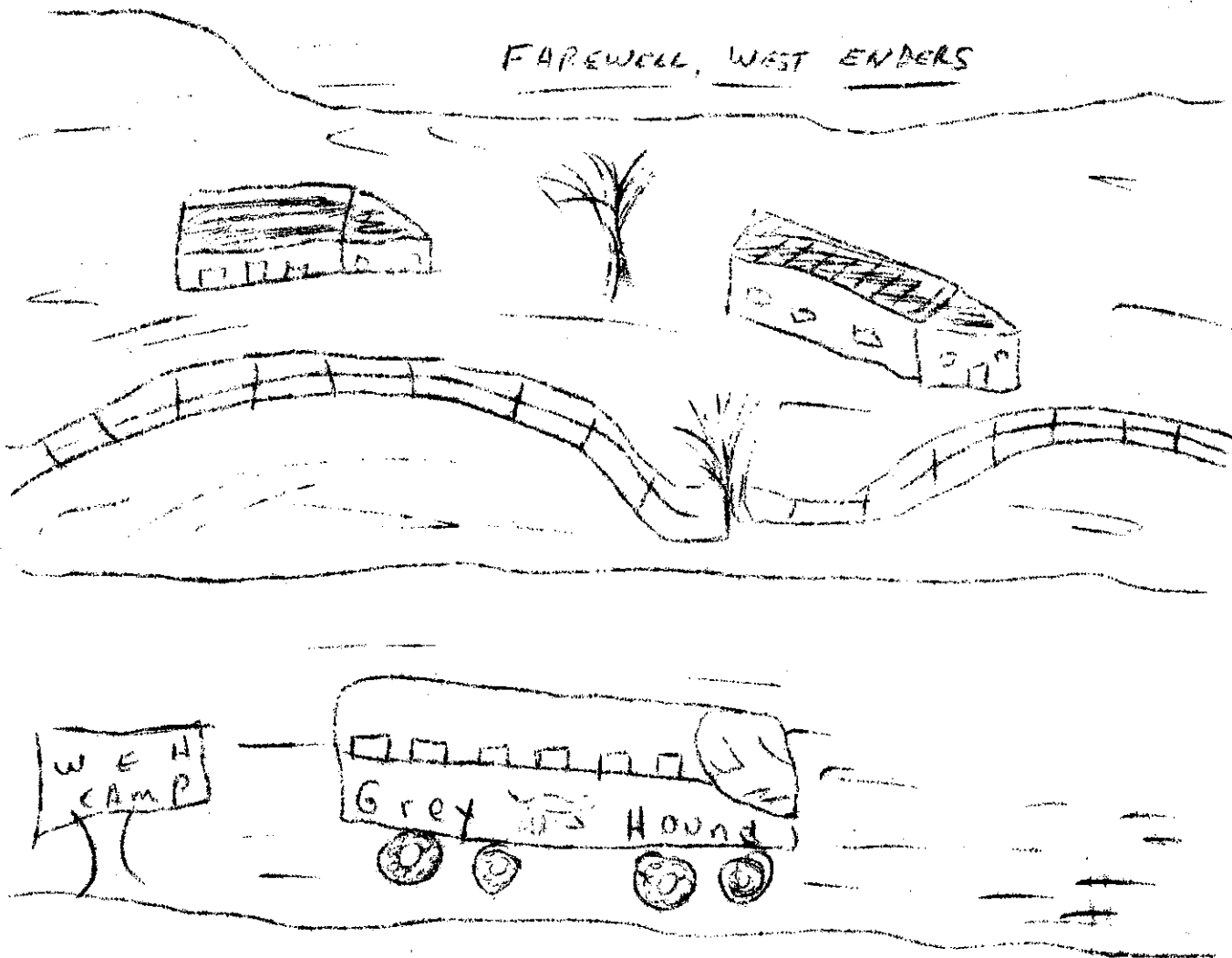


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GROUP LEAVES TODAY

On the 15th of August, 1947, the British Government transferred the powers of the government to the hands of the people of India. Previous to that, the Britishers had ruled India for about two hundred years. The imperial rule had its own tales of woes and sorrows, of hatred and bitterness. But the chief man who led India to freedom, Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, was a dedicated lover of truth and non-violence. Hatred had no place in his way of thinking; he hated the imperial system, but not any single Englishman connected with the imperial machinery. The basic Indian philosophy and tradition were on his side. Thus, India fought her battle of independence with the unique weapons of Truthfulness and Non-Violence. Reverend King is also fighting the battle of racial integration in this country with these same weapons. A United States postal stamp commemorates the name of Gandhi as the Apostle of Peace.

Free India set up its own Constituent Assembly to draft the constitution- which was proclaimed on January 26, 1950. Under it, India became a Sovereign Democratic Republic, although she continues her membership in the British Commonwealth of Nations. It was in recognition of the importance of India's membership, as well as in the true spirit of fraternity of the Members, that they allowed the Republic of India to continue her membership. The Crown became the symbol of unity of the Commonwealth, and the word "British" was deleted.

To fight the battle for freedom is quite different from the national struggle for construction and advancement. The millions are to be fed, clothed, educated, and employed by the country. Blames could no longer be shifted onto the shoulders of the imperial regime. Besides, India has stagnations and conservatism weeded to her national life from its long tradition. These forces are not always congenial to the development of a nation in the world of today. Thus, the new government of free India faced the unique problems of socio-economic and material progress. India was fortunate enough to have a dynamic constructive personality in the form of its Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, a life-long fighter in the battle for freedom, and a true disciple of Gandhiji (the suffix "ji" stands for reverence).

In spite of the great problems India faced, she was firmly determined to maintain, and even strengthen, her democratic heritage and tradition. This process naturally slowed down the pace of progress; also, it called for greater patience, sacrifice, and watchfulness on the part of the people of the country. India launched her first Five-Year Plan for planned development in 1951. Today, it is in the midst of the Third Five-Year Plan. The country is making a steady all-around progress.

This is also the age of international cooperation, especially in the field of economy. India is fortunate in having a tremendous fund of good-will from all the countries of the world, irrespective of political affiliations. India is very grateful to the United States for her continued assistance in all respects. The United States has helped us to its maximum, and is deeply interested in seeing that India develops along democratic lines. India is determined to.
