# PRESENT INDIA FOR THE CAMPERS by Arun Kumar Banerji

India fallswithin the geographic region of South Asia; its total area is half that of the United States, although its population is double that of this country's. About 70% of the people of India live in villages; agriculture is the prime occupation.

The Himalayas, the greatest mountain range on earth, protects India on the north. The peak, Mount Everest (29,142 feet), is the highest peak in the world. The latest Sino-Nepalese Border Agreement has accepted this as the boundary line between the two states of Nepal and Red China. Very recently, an American mountaineering team reached this peak- a great feat in the world of mountain climbing.

The Vindya ranges divide India into two parts- the Indo-Gangetic plains in the north, and the Deccan plateau in the South. The northerners have the Aryan and the southerners the Dravidian blood. The Indus Valley Civilisation, unearthed on the north-western parts of the country which now form West Pakistan, dates back to about 3500 B.C. It very much resembles the civilisations

found in Sumer, Babylonia, Egypt, etc., of bygone days.
India today is a land of races-like the Assamese, Bengalis, Oriyas, Beharis, Punjabis, Marathis, Gujratis, Malayalees, Tamils, Kanarese, etc. Each of these races has its own literary and cultural heritage. In addition, there are numerous other tribes and

language groups spread all over the country.

India is equal in size to continental Europe minus Russia. Various races and language groups, such as the French, Italians, Poles, Czechs, Dutch, Belgians, and Germans, inhabit this area. In Europe, each racial group has its own separate nation-state. But in India, as in America, they pull together as one nation. This is a great problem- not free from conflicts and headaches. Today the problem of national intergration in India is comparable to that of the racial integration problem in the United States. The approach and leadership on the problems in both countries, however, point to their successful solutions.

Also, India is the land of many faiths- Hindus, Muslims, Buddhists, Jains, Sikhs, Parsees, Christians, etc. The Constitution of India guarantees to every faith, as one of its fundamental rights, the right to practice, profess, and preach its own religion freely. The state is secular, and cannot patronise any denominational institutions. The President of India today is a Hindu, while the Vice-President is a Muslim. All offices and opportunities are open equally to all sects and classes. All discriminations on grounds of race, religion, sex, etc., are prohibited under the Constitution.
