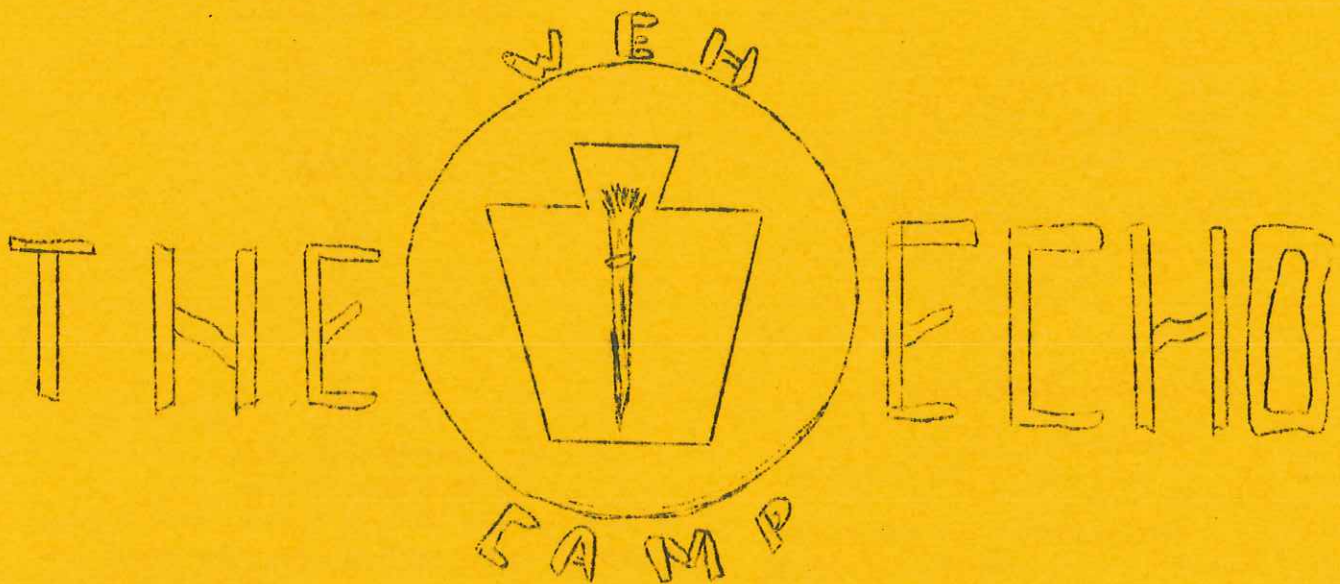

## THE OPENING OF CAMP

West End House Camp, East Parsonsfield, Maine, opened its 1964 camping season on Friday, June 26, as four Greyhound busses doubled the population of this town with 130 campers and 20 staff. ECHO THROUGH THE YEARS

ECHO, the West End House Camp newspaper, was originated by Howie Levine in 1957. In that year, Howie put together one test paper in preparation for a full scale publication in the years to come. 1958 saw the start of ECHO, Volume I, number 1. The top ECHO cover was used throughout his 1959 issues.

Neal Andelman, retruning in 1960 after a long absence from West End House, took over publication of the ECHO, and his two covers (for the years 1960 and 1961 respectively) are shown in that order on the cover.

In 1962, the present editor, Bill Margolin, became head of this newspaper. The first year his cover page consisted of one of the camp's many features (such as the waterfront, rec hall, and council ring) on one half of the page, and the feature story on the other half. In 1963, Billy devoted the whole front page to the cover, still depicting scenes from camp.

The format and purpose of the ECHO still remain the same: to give the campers, staff, and other interested people a look at West End House Camp, its daily activities, its people, and its personality.

At the conclusion of the year's activities, the yearbook, the SPIRIT, is printed, which contains a record of all the achievements accomplished / during the past year.
